





Survey Description

The survey contains 17 close-ended questions. Participants must select any one of the options in the check box for each question. There are no right or wrong answers.










5A. Inculcation of good behaviour in children is primarily a matter of?






6A. Do you think a child's mental capacity to think and act like an adult can be established through any psychological (psychometric) test?






7. Where do you think, in the Indian context, it is easiest to identify and report cases of child sexual abuse?




8. : What do you think, are mental health issues still stigmatized in Indian society?




9. Who do you think, in most of the child sexual abuse cases, the accused is?




10. Do you think mental health assessments should be a part of children's regular health checkups?




11A. Do you #Agree that children should be made aware of their rights even with the possibility of misuse?




12. What do you think, two children falling in love is an issue of?
